

PROJECT LIMITS:

- SL 288 from IH 35W to IH 35
- Project Length: 9.0 miles
- City of Denton
- Denton County

PROJECT NEED:


 Population growth will result in congestion, reduced mobility, and safety issues along existing roadway network.

PROJECT PURPOSE:

- Improve vehicular mobility
- Accommodate future traffic demand
- Improve safety

PROPOSED HIGHWAY - PHASE I








Phase I improvements would include:

- Single two-lane, two-way frontage road
- 6-foot-wide sidewalk along the frontage road
- Median that would accommodate future construction of an ultimate mainlane facility
- Typical 420-footwide proposed right of way

PROPOSED HIGHWAY - PHASE II







Phase II improvements would include:

- Completion of the full frontage road system
- Conversion of the two-way frontage road built in Phase I to a one-way operation
- Construction of the other two-lane, oneway frontage road
- Construction of grade separations at specific high-volume intersections.
- 6-foot-wide sidewalks along both frontage roads



- Underground and overhead utilities
 - Adjustments and relocations may be required prior to and during construction of the proposed project
 - No substantial service interruptions are anticipated

REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENT



The environmental review, consultation, and other actions required by applicable Federal environmental laws for this project are being, or have been, carried-out by TxDOT pursuant to 23 U.S.C. 327 and a Memorandum of Understanding dated December 9, 2019, and executed by FHWA and TxDOT.

Proposed Right of Way (ROW)/Displacements

- Approximately 414.7 acres of proposed ROW and 1.2 acres of proposed permanent drainage easements
- Displacements
 - Five single-family residences
 - One commercial property
- All ROW acquisition would be completed in accordance with the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, as amended.



Waters of the U.S., including Wetlands

- The project would result in the permanent fill of 0.41 acre of streams, 0.04 acre of impoundments, and 0.18 acres of wetlands and special aquatic sites.
- A USACE Section 404 Nationwide Permit 14 with Preconstruction Notification is required, in addition to compensatory mitigation.



Floodplains

- Portions of the project are within the 100-year floodplains of Hickory Creek, Dry Fork Hickory Creek, and their associated tributaries.
- The hydraulic design for this project would be in accordance with current FHWA, TxDOT, and local design policies, laws, regulations, and standards.



Cultural Resources

- No historic-age buildings within the Area of Potential Effects (APE) meet eligibility criteria for listing on the **National Register of Historic Places (NRHP).**
- No archeological resources recorded within the APE meet eligibility criteria for listing on the NRHP or as a State **Antiquities Landmark (SAL).**



Hazardous Materials

- Five hazardous materials sites pose a moderate environmental risk.
- All moderate risk sites are located adjacent to the project ROW.
- Special provisions will be included in the construction plans to handle hazardous materials and/or petroleum contamination according to applicable federal, state and local regulations.



Traffic Noise

- Traffic Noise Analysis showed traffic noise impacts to multiple receivers.
- Mitigation was analyzed for all impacted receivers.
- Noise barriers determined to not be feasible and reasonable for the impacted receivers.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW CONTINUED



Conclusion:

• Studies, analyses, and evaluation of the proposed project indicate no significant impacts.
